The Montgomery Canal







'The Monty' was constructed between the 1790s to 1830s, mainly to transport limestone from the Y Lanfa Please use the area below Llanymynech quarries and coal from Chirk and Oswestry to the canalside kilns. It was abandoned and to record your progress. closed in 1944. Restoration began in 1969 and is still ongoing today. Y Lanfa Powysland Museum and Welshpool Libraru. The warehouse was built in 1883/4.
